Paratroopers Big and Small

I remember conducting a Division Exercise in early 2002. My company was selected to take part in an airfield seizure. This exercise was to prepare us to jump into the heart of a foreign country and to establish a working airfield that could be used to bring in additional troops and LEGS. Our heavy drop, with artillery, Humvees, and supplies, went in first followed closely by the Parachute Infantry. Within one hour we had controlled the airfield and the Airforce Combat Controllers, who also parachuted with us that night, had established a working runway. Soon C-17 Cargo planes were landing and delivering M-1 Abrahams

Paratroopers are remembered for large scale assaults and taking large amounts of ground. But on November 28th 1970 MACV SOG conducted the first High Altitude Low Opening (HALO) Combat Parachute jump into Laos. Their mission was not to take ground but to Recon it. MACV SOG would go on to make another 3 Combat HALO jumps during the Vietnam War.

Tanks and other armor to support us.

While many Paratroopers were hailed for their efforts in Combat Parachute Jumps in WWII, MACV SOG had to remain quiet about their jumps for over 20 years. Finally their operations were declassified in the early 1990's and the Paratroopers were able to attach the gold "Combat" Star to their HALO Jump wings. There are reports already coming from both Afghanistan and Iraq that Special Forces teams have once again used HALO jumps to complete missions.

Paratroopers are not limited to the mission of taking ground. Paratroopers are skilled in fighting the enemy wherever they hide.

With a rifle and wings the American Paratrooper is the greatest soldier for any mission.

Dear Badger Chapter Members:







Bill Kunhke grew up on a farm in Maine, WI and when you look at his Airborne records you might see him as Gary Cooper playing Sgt. York, the expert rifleman shooting rabbits on the run. You might also wonder if there were any Army schools he missed or if there are any deer left in his county these

We'd need Life Magazine to do justice to Bill's accomplishments, a few of his pictures here tell only part of the story. Before he was discharged in 1966 after being severely wounded while fighting with the 1st Cav in Vietnam, Bill was one terrific Airborne rifleman! In 1963—64, he made the All Army Rifle Team and competed in the National Matches at Camp Perry OH. Prior to that he performed with high honors at Ft. Benning Jump School, 1952: Winter Training, Camp Drum with the 82nd. 1953; Jungle Training, 1953; Ft. Jackson NCO School, 1953; 1st Cav NCO School Japan, 1955; Advanced NCO School Ft. Benning, 1958; Basic Military Mountaineering School, Japan, where he was an Honor Student in 1954; Jump Master School, 82nd, 1958; Air Transportability/Aerial Delivery Course, 82nd, 1958; Jump Master School, 101st, 1963; US Army Marksmanship, 101st, (Honor Grad) 1964; and numerous Rifle Marksmanship courses and clinics! Bill received Letters of Appreciation for IX Corps Mountain Training School in 1955; for being a member of the winning team in the USAREUR 8th ID, Germany 1959; Individual Champion of AETVAGPR, 1962; ASTHECO Champion 1962; USAEUR, Championship Rifle Team Match Team Member, 8th ID.

He served with the 82nd from 1952-54 and again from 1957-58; with the 1st Cay, Japan, 1955-57. In 1958 he moved to Germany with the 504 which became part of the 8th ID Airborne, sometimes known as "The Crazy Eights". He served with the 101st at Ft. Campbell from 1962-66. In 1966 while fighting with the 1st Cav in Vietnam he was shot in the right arm and leg and discharged with a 100% disability.

That did not stop Bill from becoming a NRA Lifetime Master, High Power Rifle.

Hello Tom,

Thank you for this kind invitation to inform you about my relation to Bud & Diane and the 82nd AB Division

I was born on June 5th, 1939; the same month as the Nazis had the guts to occupy my country...and to terrorize our people. On a sunny Sunday-afternoon probably September 17, 1944), I was with my father on our way to church:

> suddenly the heaven was filled with heavy humming noise and the sky was covered by countless airplanes; parachutes

Many years later my Father, Adrian, told me that in the war at age 19 he had met an American Paratrooper with whom he had a lot of adventures in actions of the allied forces against the Nazi's. Adrian told me that they still had contact in writing with the American Soldier who happened to be (you guessed already): **Doc Stolp.** So there were letters between Stolp and my parents Nell & Adrian. Now, since my parents died, communication by e-mail was the new option and since 1998 there is a regular email-contact between Bud and me. Bud and I have become very close friends, we did never meet in person but anyway there's a



warm felt bond between the two of us and our respective partners. So I hope that you have an Idea now about the connection between Bud and me; We respect and like each other; it's a pity that it was a war that caused our friendship; we in Holland feel so thankful to The Allied Forces who came to liberate us from the Krauts; we will be in debt forever for all that brave guys who came to rescue us.

We feel so sorry that a lot of you guys did not make it and had to pay the ultimate... We sincerely hope that they all arrived at their private DZ and may they be happy there forever! May this comfort their relatives. No need to state here; that the same goes for all those of the Allied Forces especially of the 82nd Airborne Division who did make it and have returned safely to their beloved country and relatives: Thank you So Much; May God Bless you ALL and the USA!

John will contact Big Ed's son about the flags. 2). The BSC Airborne Legacy Showcase has been in Sauk City, 3 months, is now in Baraboo, will be for a total of 6 months, and on Nov. 2nd it will go to the Mukwonago Public Library for 3 months. Thank you to Rick Walen for setting that up. 3) Wisconsin WWII Airborne Veterans Dinner after action report, copy handed out to the members. 101st Airborne brief history, copy handed out. Membership application blank copy, handed out.
